

CURRENT SATELLITE SYSTEMS

There are currently five (5) satellite systems which are either connected to the WMU sanitary sewer collection system, or are candidates for connection or acquisition by WMU in the foreseeable future. All five communities are currently customers of Kentucky-American Water. Generally, WMU sewer customers are also connected to the WMU water system.

1. Treehaven – A community of 214 mobile home private residences. The collection system is privately owned by the owner of the mobile home park. The community is currently a WMU customer for treatment only. The collection system discharges to a pump station owned by WMU. The customer currently pays for all flow to WMU's system, including infiltration/inflow (I/I). There is no plan to acquire or directly operate the Treehaven collection system in the immediate future.

2. Rockwell Village – A community of 93 private residences in Rockwell Village Mobile Home Park and five (5) industrial customers; Southern States, JenMar, Southern Wood, Pro Nutech, and Quality Manufacturing. There is currently no pre-treatment program for industrial wastewater flows. The collection system discharges to a package plant owned by Kentucky-American Water. The package plant is currently in violation of its permit. WMU has been directed by the Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet (EPPC), now re-organized as the Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC) of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, to accept wastewater from Rockwell Village. As of January 2009, the connection has not been completed due to on-going negotiations on issues regarding infiltration/inflow, pre-treatment, costs allocation, and connection fees. There is no current plan to acquire or directly operate the Rockwell Village collection system.

3. East Kentucky Power Cooperative Package Plant – The collection/treatment system serves a single customer, the East Kentucky Power (EKP) corporate office. Sources of wastewater include flows from a truck wash and laboratory. The collection system is under order from the Energy and Environment Cabinet to connect to the WMU system. WMU projects the collection system will be connected in the next 5 years.

4. Verna Hills – Verna Hills maintains a collection/treatment system serving approximately 90 residential customers. The system discharges to a treatment system consisting of a package treatment plant/lagoon system, currently operated and maintained by the community's Homeowners Association (HOA). WMU does not have immediate plans to connect or acquire/operate this system.

5. Yorktown Mobile Home Community – The collection/treatment system serves approximately 100 residential customers. Wastewater currently discharges to a treatment system consisting of a package treatment plant/lagoon system. The system is currently operated and maintained by the owner of the mobile home park. WMU has no immediate plan to acquire or connect this system.
